## Eastbourne's very own Dorit receives the British **Empire Medal**

**DORIT Oliver-Wolff has** received her British **Empire Medal.**

The ceremony took place in the Mayor's Parlour and the Lord Lieutenant, Peter Field, was present with the Deputy Lieutenant, Violet Hancock.

Eastbourne Mayor Steve Wallis said: "Dorit is an inspiration to so many, from surviving the holocaust, a singing career, writing, lecturing and supporting so many charities.

"We in Eastbourne are lucky to have her amongst us and I am honoured to have her as a friend.

"Well done Dorit Oliver-Wolff BEM."

Dorit Oliver-Wolff, 84, was given a British Empire Medal for services to Holocaust education and awareness.

She has been giving talks to schools, community groups and businesses about her experiences for more than a decade.

She said she was "really excited" to be honoured for just doing her job.

Ms Oliver-Wolff was born in Novi Sad in Serbia – formerly Yugoslavia – and was unaware that she was lewish until the age of five, when a woman spat at her on the street.

In 1941, she and her mother fled and travelled from place to place within Hungary, creating new identities

before hiding in a cellar, from where her mother would sneak out at night to look for food in bombed-out shops.

She returned to Serbia in 1945 after the Soviet army liberated Hungary, where she discovered that her father and the rest of the family had been killed by the Nazis.

Ms Oliver-Wolff said all she wanted to do was "to become a singer one day".

Two years later she was awarded a scholarship to a music academy and went on to become a jazz and blues singer and "pin-up" model in Germany.

Ms Oliver-Wolff was among 31 people recognised in the New Year Honours list for Holocaust education.

Just because 2020 has been a bit rubbish, does not mean that Christmas needs to be cancelled! Your Eastbourne BID has been planning Christmas 2020 since last year and our plans have had to change many times.

Now though, we have these activities finalised and confirmed. There might be last minute changes due to COVID regulations but we are confident that Eastbourne's Christmas 2020 will not be cancelled.

#### Lights

Much of the lighting scheme is replicated from last year, with lights in Little Chelsea, Terminus Road, Cornfield Road, Cornfield Terrace and Gildredge Road.

In addition to this, we are including new installations in Station Parade as well as the return of lights in Bolton Road and Langney Road. Also, we have commissioned festoon lighting (like that in Grove Road over winter) to be installed in Station Street and Terminus Road between Cancer Research UK and TJ Hughes.

These should all be installed by the 16th of November.

#### Christmas Market and Christmas Youth Market

Fabulous food, delicious drinks and gorgeous gifts! Eastbourne's Christmas Market will be taking place from 17th to 20th December. ## Author launches novel in aid of anti-trafficking in Cambodia

EASTBOURNE author Gabrielle Yetter released her new novel Whisper of the Lotus on November 9th to support Justice and Soul, an anti-trafficking organisation.

Inspired by her experiences while living in Cambodia, the book is a fictional story about Charlotte Fontaine, a young woman who travels to Phnom Penh to visit her best friend and meets a mysterious elderly man on the flight. When she arrives, she discovers a land of golden temples, orangeclad monks, and kind-hearted people, then realises many things are not what they seem—including her own family relationships that bubble to the surface through a series of revelations.

It was released on November 9th, Cambodian Independence Day. "I wanted to share some of the exotic charm of the country in my book," Gabrielle said. "After experiencing how it felt to live there, I wanted to take readers into my Cambodia. I have included a number of fascinating real-life characters—some of whom are named, such as SomOn, our tuk-tuk driver, who became a friend, and I've woven actual-life situations into the story.

"Throughout the book, Charlotte is on a quest that takes her through dusty back alleys and shimmering pagodas where she meets people who provide insights into her own strengths and imperfections: a sleazy café owner, a compassionate Buddhist monk, an elderly Cambodian who survived the Khmer Rouge, and a woman who reminds her of her mother. And all of them play a role in teaching her different things about herself."

Whisper of the Lotus is a multilayered story full of memorable characters and the sights and senses of a magical country.

## 'Fragile world' mural wins praise

AN Eastbourne artist has transformed an old wall in Hampden Park into a spectacular mural with an environmental focus.

Tanya-Lisa Parsons, who is also known on social media as *Jewl*, has painted a striking image she describes as 'a fragile world suspended in the void of space' on the biggest wall of the old changing rooms in Hampden Park, facing the sports fields. Eastbourne Borough Council gave her permission for the mural following her request.

Speaking of her inspiration for the art project, Tanya said: "We are running out of time to save our planet. We can all make a difference by taking action – future generations depend on it."

Tanya used to suffer with dependency issues and volunteered with East Sussex Recovery Alliance at *Café North* to run an art class called

Addicted2Art for people recovering from drug addiction but this has stopped due to COVID-19.

"Having this has been a useful stop gap and still enables me to get my message out there," she said.

Tanya has also helped the organisation *Bhassexplore*, which removes rubbish along the coastline from Cuckmere Haven to Holywell, and made a life size mermaid from some of the debris collected. Her Hampden Park mural, which features glow-in-the-dark paint, is already turning the heads of parkusers and a local school has showed pictures of her work in their online assembly and is bringing pupils to the park to view the artwork first-hand.

Tanya added: "Being able to inspire others through my work is the biggest high of all."

## Towner wins!

### EASTBOURNE'S Towner Art Gallery named 'Museum of the Year'.

Five museums and galleries, including the Towner Art Gallery, have shared the coveted title of 'Museum of the Year' title for 2020.

The judges decided to split the honour five ways this year rather than picking one winner as usual.

The winners range from London's Science Museum to Gairloch Museum, in a former nuclear bunker in north-west Scotland. The others are Aberdeen Art Gallery, South London Gallery and Towner Art Gallery in Eastbourne.

In recent years, the 'Museum of the Year' winner has received  $\pounds100,000$ , with four other shortlisted institutions getting  $\pounds10,000$  each. This year, the five winners will pocket  $\pounds40,000$  each.

The Art Fund said the shake-up was a response to the "unprecedented challenges that all museums face this year".

The Towner Gallery was praised for the way it had "redefined its purpose as a free and open community



resource and launched a new vision to transform communities through art" despite a cut in funding.

The judges said they also admired its "genuine commitment to promoting under-represented artists".

Joe Hill, Director of Towner Eastbourne, said "We are delighted to be a winner of Art Fund Museum of the Year 2020.

"It's been a privilege to lead Towner since 2018 and to work with my wonderful colleagues and our partners to develop Towner into the institution we are now; a community hub for art and culture at the heart of our town.

"In 2019, as we marked our tenth anniversary in our current building, we had a chance to celebrate and reflect on the impact that the arts can have on a place.

### Training for new specialist cardiac doctors at the DGH

SIMULATION training for new specialist cardiac doctors to improve their skills with heart procedures has taken place in a Covid secure environment at the Trust.

This allows doctors the opportunity to learn and practice procedures in a simulated situation using high-tech mannequins and IT training devices. Professor Nikhil Patel, Consultant Cardiologist and Course Director said: "During these challenging times we are delighted to be taking part in this improved form of training for cardiac doctors. We are proud that Eastbourne DGH is one of a handful of hospitals in the UK selected to be involved.



Specialist cardiac doctors in training

"Simulation training has been around a long time in the aviation industry and is now integral in medical training. This training uses high-tech mannequins and simulators to help junior doctors learn and develop their technique so that they are safe and prepared before they perform these procedures on patients. The feedback we have received from the British Cardiac Society on our course as well as the trainees themselves is extremely positive." Dr Richard Veasey, Consultant Cardiologist said: "We were very excited to have been able to deliver this with social distancing and the new challenges this year has brought us."

The simulation training covered team working, angiography (examining blood vessels using X-ray), pace making procedures and cardiac echocardiography.

# Specialist support for people diagnosed with sight loss

THE Royal National Institute of Blind People and East Sussex Healthcare NHS Trust have launched a new service providing emotional and practical support to people newly diagnosed with sight loss.

A new Eye Clinic Liaison Officer (ECLO) will work alongside health professionals to offer support and advice to blind and partially sighted people in East Sussex; working between Eastbourne District General and Bexhill Hospitals, as well as Conquest Hospital when needed. Areas of support include independent living, returning to work, benefit entitlements, emotional support, and coping at home.

Michaela Hendrick, pictured, has been recruited to the ECLO role at East Sussex Healthcare NHS Trust.

Michaela said: "I can offer support to people when they might be feeling at their lowest. I understand that if someone arrives in clinic and they are told their sight is getting worse, it's life-changing news. This applies to those with long-standing sight loss or newly diagnosed.

My role is about reassuring the patient that they're not alone and helping them get the right support in a timely manner to enable them to remain independent."

## Police carry out crackdown

### THE Police doing their best to crack down on anti-social behaviour in Eastbourne.

#### MORE than 400 hours of patrols were carried out by police in Eastbourne during a week-long crackdown on anti-social behaviour.

Each day of the October half term, around a dozen officers from the Neighbourhood Policing Team (NPT) conducted targeted patrols in hotspot areas, visited vulnerable communities and took action against those committing road-related and drug-related crimes.

The team, made up of police officers and police community support officers (PCSOs), arrested 10 people for offences including drug dealing, possession of drugs and arson.

#### **Vulnerable safeguarded**

This included two people who were arrested after officers stopped a vehicle suspected of being involved in the supply of Class A drugs. This also led to a vulnerable woman being safeguarded from potential harm and cuckooing.

A wanted person was also arrested after police paid an unannounced visit to a vulnerable man who had been targeted by drug dealers in the past. Officers working to safeguard the man took proactive action to support him and in doing so, found someone who was wanted for failing to attend court. This was one of around 10 visits paid to victims of cuckooing to ensure they are being supported and sufficient safeguarding is in place.

Five vehicles were seized during the week for having no valid insurance. All were identified by officers on patrol, and resulted in the drivers being fined and given penalty points.

#### **Drugs and alcohol seized**

Other seizures included drugs, knives, alcohol and a suspected stolen credit card. A large quantity of alcohol was seized from underage drinkers in the Motcombe area after police responded to a call from a resident.

The group had been causing a significant disturbance and impacting families nearby, but were dealt with by PCSOs using their powers of alcohol seizure.

During the course of the week's activity, police also gathered 30 pieces of intelligence around drugs, suspicious vehicles, and wanted persons.

#### Listening to concerns

Eastbourne NPT Acting Sergeant Ed Faulkner said: "We are always listening to the concerns of our communities, and working to address the issues that are a priority for those living and working in our town.

"This week has shown that, with officers carrying out a total of

435 hours of dedicated patrol activity in areas such as Gildredge Park, Pavilion Gardens, Longland Recreation Ground, Shinewater, Colonnade Gardens and many others. Much of this activity has been in the evenings, when anti-social behaviour often increases.

"While we always focus on antisocial behaviour and protecting the vulnerable, we stepped up our activity this week to coincide with the October half-term and Halloween, and we saw some great results from this.

"We want to be clear that we will not accept any behaviour that affects the quality of life for our residents, and we will continue to tackle it all year round."

#### **Anti-social driving**

On Friday (October 23), officers and PCSOs on patrol dispersed a large group of young people gathering at the Bandstand, disrupted a number of people suspected of being involved in drug offences and seized alcohol from people behaving in a disruptive manner in the town centre.

Officers deployed the Speed Indicator Device (SID) on the seafront from 5.30pm to educate and encourage drivers to slow down, and maintained a presence at Admiral Retail Park following complaints of anti-social driving. Other patrol areas included Gildredge Park, Hampden Park, Princes Park and Old Town Recreation Ground.

#### **Burglary arrests**

On Saturday (October 24), the team continued their activity, patrolling Shinewater Park, Princes Park, Helen Gardens, Gildredge Park, Roselands Park, Old Town Recreation Ground and Hampden Park. They made two arrests for burglary and issued a Section 59 warning to a motorist driving in an anti-social manner. Officers also ensured a visible presence in areas that had recently seen a number of deliberate fires, and patrolled Beachy Head and Langney Shopping Centre following reports of noisy cars and motorbikes.

#### Cuckooing

On Sunday (October 25), the focus was on safeguarding a victim of cuckooing. This is a term used when those involved in drug dealing take over and exploit the home of a local person, forcing or coercing them into allowing their accommodation to be used as a base to run the drugs supply from. Often, this activity also attracts reports of anti-social behaviour and environmental crime.

The team also stopped and spoke with a number of motorists about the manner of their driving. They seized two vehicles being driven with no insurance and reported the drivers involved.

#### Visible presence

Inspector Rachel Barrow of the Eastbourne Neighbourhood Policing Team, said: "We acknowledge and appreciate the distress anti-social behaviour can cause to people living and working in Eastbourne.

"Our officers have maintained a visible presence in areas where antisocial behaviour and disorder has been raised as an issue, and we've seen some really positive disruptions as a result.

"Our work to tackle this issue is ongoing all the time, not just during half term week, and we encourage people to report incidents of disorder to us so we can respond. As well as the dedicated Operation Blitz phone number, people can continue to report to us online or by calling **101**.

# Reducing your risk of surgery

WITH 60,000 operations a year, the removal of our gallbladder is one of the most common operations in the UK each year. But can our diet limit our risk of needing this surgery?

#### The main reason for gallbladder removal is due to disruption of our bile flow, which is often linked to a poor diet.

#### The digestive cycle

Our bile is a fluid that is made and released by the liver, but is stored in our gallbladder. Bile contains substances (like cholesterol, bile salts and bilirubin) that help with digestion by breaking down fats before they reach our small intestine.

Our bile is also needed to neutralise food after it has been soaked in our stomach acid. Without bile, this acidic food would irritate the lining of our small intestine.

Maintaining the health of our small intestine is important, as it's responsible for producing particular hormones (called cholecystokinin) that stimulate the gallbladder to contract and release bile. Bile flow is part of an efficient cycle: a healthy small intestine gives the gallbladder the means to contract bile, and in response, bile breaks down fats and neutralises foods so that the small intestine has the ability to make more hormones (and absorb our nutrients into our bloodstream). A healthy flow of bile ensures the health of our digestion of fats, liver, gallbladder and small intestine.

#### 'Sludge' happens

This healthy cycle is often disrupted, and it can lead for the need of surgery. If our small intestine is irritated or not functioning properly, then it does not make the hormones needed for the gallbladder to contract, so less fats are being digested and bile in the gallbladder begins to stagnate and congeal.

Over time, the stagnant bile becomes thick, and it is not able to flow as easily out of the gallbladder. Bile that is not moving also begins to accumulate toxins. This thick, toxic bile is referred to as 'sludge,' and it can be very dangerous. Most often, 'sludge' begins to clump together to form gallstones, which are the leading cause of gallbladder removal surgery. If gallstones or bile 'sludge' are not removed, they can block the ducts and cause permanently damage of our liver and pancreas, or even lifethreatening infections, like sepsis.

Signs of gallstones, bile 'sludge' or lack of fat digestion from an overwhelmed gallbladder include bloating, upper-right abdominal pain, heartburn, burping, nausea, diarrhea, jaundice and pale-coloured stools. However, the majority of people with poor bile flow show no symptoms. This makes it even more important to support our bile flow, gallbladder and small intestine health to prevent future surgery.

#### **Preventing surgery**

There are some factors within our control that can limit our risk of surgery. According to the NHS, being obese or overweight "increases your risk of gallstones," so losing excess weight will limit our risk. In addition, there are certain foods that can irritate the lining of our small intestine, which affects it's ability to create the hormones the gallbladder needs. These foods include those that contain gluten, wheat, eggs, soy and dairy. For anyone with intolerances to these foods, or with any symptoms of poor bile flow, it may be best to avoid these foods.

To improve the quality and flow of bile it is best to avoid foods that are known to congeal and thicken bile: vegetable oils inside processed foods, margarine, yogurt, ice-cream, milk, butter, aged cheeses, nut butters, red meat, salmon, eggs and chicken. In addition, any foods that are high in sugars, fats, or carbohydrates can overwhelm the gallbladder's ability to break down fat, increasing the risk of poor bile flow.

#### The 'Preventative' diet

Our diet can greatly boost the flow of our bile and healthy digestive cycle. Since our bile is 85% water, it is extra important to stay hydrated with any signs of bile issues. The renouned *Mayo Clinic* recommends we should be consuming at least three liters of water a day. This includes water from beverages, fruits and vegetables.

A diet high in fiber helps clear toxins built up in our bile. Raw leafy greens, lentils, Brussels sprouts, carrots, artichokes, apples, beets, berries and broccoli are all high in fiber and help to support the digestive system.

Sprouted and fermented foods contain natural probiotics and prebiotics that help to reduce inflammation in our small intestine, and feed our 'good' gut bacteria the food it needs to produce the hormones needed to contract the bile out of our gallbladder.

Originally from the Potteries in Stoke on Trent, she visited Eastbourne every year with her family and they always stayed at the Hydro Hotel. She remembers the families who used to meet every year and have croquet tournaments. Her 9th Novel, *A Daughters Hope* Features the glamourous Hydro Hotel, in the 1950s.

Margaret started writing at 57, why did she wait? "When my youngest son went off to university, he said, 'You've always wanted to write and now you have no excuse.""

#### Short stories

"We are told to write about what you know, so I started with my earliest memory of hiding under the table from

Her readers noticed that social injustice was a common thread in the books as well as always having a feel good story.

"In current times, we need escapism. I see reading as a form of therapy. As good as a visit to the doctors for a tonic."

She has just completed her 10th book, and her advice is "It's never too late."

# Green and pleasant

NOVEMBER is generally the month many of us celebrate Bonfire Night at group events but COVID-19 will have put payed to many of our events for 2020. Maybe celebrate with a few in the garden at home! Read on for some planting ideas to mimic your own, plant inspired, fireworks.

With the shorter days, colder weather and probably more rain, we need to cram more into the few hours each day that we will be able to spend outside this month.

#### Fireworks in the garden

There are quite a few plants that are very reminiscent of fireworks. One in particular, Allium Schubertii, (pictured in header) is the firework allium par excellence, with vast wonderful dark pink, spiky flowers. It is very eccentric and showy while flowering and great when dried too. Schubertii is a bulbous perennial producing brightgreen, strap-shaped leaves in spring, which die back before the flowers appear. These consist of 50 or more star-shaped, pinky-purple florets on stems of differing lengths producing a starburst effect up to 30cm across. So maybe this month is a good time to plant some in your garden for great results in 2021 and beyond!

Another firework inspired planting might be Pennisetum setaceum 'Fireworks' (rueppllii) which makes a lively addition to bedding displays and patio containers. The fluffy seed heads can be also cut to make elegant dried flowers. The colourful foliage of this fountain grass emerges with bold stripes of red, pink and green, before maturing to a rich shade of burgundy. From mid-summer to autumn, the showy purple flower spikes rise above the arching foliage in a spectacular architectural 'bonfire' display.

#### Tulips

If you have not got around to planting your tulip bulbs, it's not too late to get it done. November is the perfect month. Don't be afraid to cram more in the pot than the packet advises. You want a full display, there's nothing worse than a few sparse stems. Just make sure the bulbs are not touching, leaving a centimetre or two between them. Tulips don't like to sit around in soggy soil so do make sure there is good drainage at the bottom of the pot.

#### Grasses

This time of the year is also a great time to cut back many grass flowers or tatty seed heads. The flower and seed heads of ornamental grasses play a vital factor in providing winter interest and look wonderful covered in frost or snow, but there's a good chance they are looking a bit untidy now as they collapse and break away. In this case, the best thing to do is to cut them back to the base with secateurs.

The front beach garden at Driftwood is awash with many grasses, my favourite of which is stipa tenuissima or pony tails grass. It is a wonderfully impressive plant, with its evergreen base clump of leaves topped in summer with an array of flowering spikes, which turn from silvery green to gold. These can be cut and dried when first opened for use in winter arrangements indoors. Alternatively, they make a useful winter food source for seed-eating birds. I find these still look good through the winter, so tend to leave trimming mine until the Spring.

#### **Possible frosts**

The weather has started to turn a good deal colder at nights now, so I hope you have taken steps to protect your tender plants. If you are leaving any frost tender plants in the ground, it's a good idea to spread a thick mulch around the base to protect the crown from cold temperatures. That way, even if the top growth is killed off, the roots have a better chance of survival and may re-sprout fresh growth. If you have alpines or sempervivum clumps out in the garden try to ensure that they are not getting swamped by a topping of soggy leaves from trees above. Remove them before they smother the crowns of these delicate plants and cause them to rot.

#### **Autumnal container**

Why not think about creating a colourful pot to help brighten those winter days when you look out into the garden or onto your patio/ balcony? There are many different plants you can use to create a wonderfully seasonal hardy container. All your local garden centres should have a good range of lovely plants to choose from. There are many different containers you can choose from but try and ensure it is roomy and pick a mixture of evergreen shrubs, conifers, hardy ferns, bedding or even some hardy herbs too. Be sure to create good drainage by adding crocks or gravel to the base of the container and make sure the container has holes in the base too. Fill the pot two thirds full of compost and begin to pack your plants in. Try and arrange them with the taller ones at the back or middle. Make sure you back-fill any gaps between your plants with compost to make for tight dense planting and no roots showing. Don't forget to water and maybe raise from the ground, good drainage usually means less chance of frost damage.
