Cadence offers somewhere to meet, grab a coffee or a bite to eat.

Cycle hire, servicing and repairs, plus e-bike guided tours will also be available in the near future.

It's a quirky venue with the promise of great coffee backed by on-site roastery *Liquid Spirit*.

Along with a large courtyard, there is ample space for cyclists and walkers peeling off the South Downs Way, surrounding bridleways, trails and country lanes. It aims to serve and connect with people who love the outdoors and is welcoming visitors arriving on foot or via two wheels.

Reclaimed, recyclable and compostable products and materials have been used throughout.

Cadence has been launched by passionate local cyclists Roger Myall and Matthew Jackson and opened directly after Christmas.

It is open every Wednesday to Sunday during winter.

Matthew, who lives in Alfriston, said: "The Cuckmere Valley has always been a popular destination for those with a love of outdoor pursuits, such as cycling and walking.

"Cadence offers the opportunity for these people to refuel and meet in a welcoming and inclusive environment, and to feel part of the Cadence community that we are building."

A challenging year for everyone at the DGH

IT'S been a tough year for staff at the Eastbourne DGH, tougher than anyone could ever have imagined.

Covid has had a massive impact, and here we look at some of the latest news from the hospital.

- **1.** The Trust continues to recruit nurses from abroad. A total of 22 International nurses arrived on October 23 with another 21 due on November 27. The planned intake for 2020/21 is 100.
- **2.** Over the last 12 months there has been a net increase of 197.1 full time equivalent staff. 116.7 ftes joined the Trust in October and 78.3 ftes left.
- **3.** There was a total of 597.7 FTE leavers in the rolling 12 months. Annual turnover has reduced by 0.1% to 9.8%
- **4.** The Trust has continued to run Cancer Recovery focus weeks with all service to review all patients on the waiting list. This has supported the continued reduction of the 62-day backlog over the past three months, whilst patient pathways over 104 days have also continued to reduce.

- **5.** The past few months have been particularly challenging for the Emergency Departments. They are performing above average and are 29th out of 115 reporting organisations. The risk is an increasing level of patients with staffing gaps challenging to fill.
- **6.** On average during October, there were 176 people each day going to the DGH A and E department. That's 13 less than 2019.
- **7.** The Trust continues to meet the two-week wait cancer standard.
- **8.** The Trust continues to face the challenge of treating the number of patients waiting over 62 days and 104 days which in turn impacts on performance. ESHT is 59th out of 123 reporting organisations.

Let's all hope that 2021 is eventually a less pressurised one for our amazing hospital.

Clever and gifted at sport, particularly rugby and cricket, he excelled at Eastbourne Grammar School and could have gone to Oxford.

He eventually became a sports teacher and branched out to English, history and drama, teaching at St. Andrews School in Meads and Ratton.

He played rugby for *Eastbourne Rugby Club* and cricket for Sussex and Jevington where he became club president.

Fine friend

Ollie possessed a fine baritone voice and was often cast in amateur dramatics productions, once giving a lively performance as Bill Sykes in *Oliver*. Anderida chairman Tony Flood said: "Both Ollie and Tamara showed tremendous courage as he battled so long against cancer. He was a great friend to Anderida, coming to several meetings with Tamara, and was always very friendly and helpful. He will be much missed by everyone who had the pleasure of meeting him.

"Tamara benefited greatly from her husband's support while writing so many best selling books under her own name and that of Ellie Dean. This helped her to achieve world fame with sales of more than 2,000,000 copies."

IT was after the fire at Windsor Castle that the Queen spoke of her 'annus horibilus', and I feel sure that would be a fitting description for the year 2020.

It has affected most of our population in one way or another, some just inconvenience but others who have been seriously hit by the virus itself.

The travel industry has been massively affected this year with bans on flying to a number of countries or two-week quarantine when you get back from a foreign visit: most of the airlines don't reckon they will be back to 2019 levels of passenger carrying until 2023 at the earliest.

Anchored cruise ships

The cruise lines have not had nearly so much publicity, but all the major companies are not reckoning to be sailing until Easter and in the meantime, there are many cruise ships to be seen anchored off Weymouth.

On a smaller basis, travel agencies have had a torrid time with enforced lockdowns, inability to get clients to where they wish to go and fighting to get refunds for their clients.

Looking forward

Anyway, enough of the past, we need to look forward to 2021 which surely must be considerably better now that the vaccine is being rolled out.

When to book

The travel industry has always been advocating booking early and the airlines have their cheapest fares for the earliest bookers, but it does surprise me that there would be so many travel organisations promoting the same message in this time of uncertainty.

Towards the end of last year, I was advocating leaving actual holiday bookings until the beginning of 2021 when I reckoned that things would be more certain, but I think I would now amend that advice by saying that whilst browsing for holiday ideas can be done once current lockdown is over, it is going to be better to leave any commitment until at least February when I believe things will at last be clearer and less risk of a sudden further lockdown.

Brexit travel changes

Outside the EU there are no changes, and the only significant change for

There has also been a lot of talk about the withdrawal of reciprocal free health provisions. Whilst this is true, it is largely academic as very few people go abroad without a travel insurance because it covers much more than just medical expenses.

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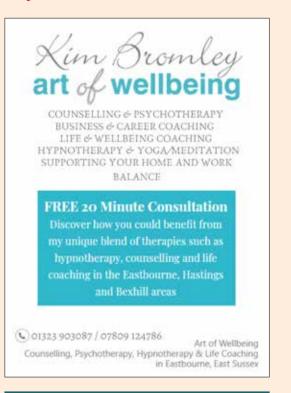
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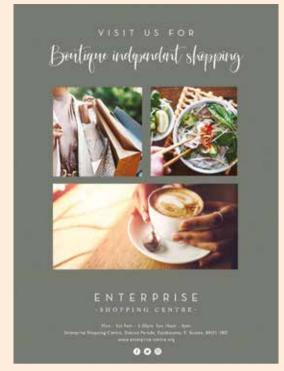
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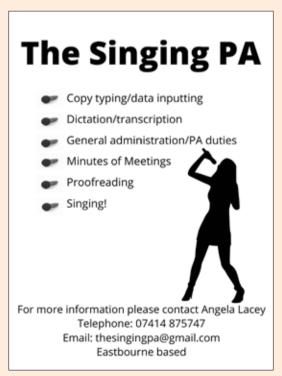
















AN East Sussex Wildlife charity is urging everyone to choose your New Year resolutions carefully for 2021.

East Sussex Wildlife Rescue & Ambulance Service (WRAS) dealt with more than 5100 incidents in 2020, including many in the Eastbourne area.

That was an increase of over 1100 from the previous year.

Now the charity, led by Trevor Weeks MBE, is asking us to think about:

- Keeping gardens safe for wildlife.
- Safe driving to avoid road casualties.
- Avoiding dropping litter or other harmful waste.
- Support feeding wildlife in a healthy and sustainable way.

Think about our wildlife in 2021

- Avoiding the use of slug pellets and pesticides.
- Encouraging wildlife with suitable gardening.
- Keeping control of pets.
- Choosing humane deterrence and keeping properties well maintained.

Trevor Weeks MBE, pictured, said: "Wildlife rescue organisations are some of the most underfunded organisations that exist.

"Unfortunately, many organisations have a misguided believe that wildlife rescue organisations don't benefit the community.

"We all rely on public support and donations. A donation of as little as £1 a month can make a lasting difference and allow organisations to budget for the future.

"Also consider leaving them a legacy when you are gone. People can consider volunteering too, but this is not easy currently due to COVID-19."

They are aged just 15 and 12 but their project has taken off so much a bright 2021 awaits the Eastbourne pair.

Animate Our Logo creates an animated logo for businesses, both local and international, within a 72-hour turnover period.

They create between 8-12 new designs each month to help keep the website and content fresh.

This means each design is only sold for one month and as it expires is replaced by fresh content.

Long road ahead

The boys are proud of what they have achieved but realise the road to success is a long one.

They said: "One of the first things we have learnt in business is that not all of the money is profit, so we are still paying for some of the set-up costs.

"Once we have paid for this, we would love to be able to buy a PlayStation 5 and then after that we plan on putting everything else in a savings account for driving lessons and a car when we are older.

"We have already had some amazing customers and reviews from them, and this makes us proud to live in Eastbourne."

Inspiration

It's been an amazing first four months. They were first inspired by the biographies of business figures such as Steve Jobs and Duncan Bannatyne.

Dad David Knight said the homeschooling period through lockdown had triggered the boys to have the idea for animated logos.

It has taken off massively.

Two winners of the *BBC Apprentice* have been in touch.

Joseph Valente, who won the show in 2015, connected with the boys online, and then posted about the business on his social media to an audience of thousands.

And Sarah Lynn, who won in 2017, became a customer for the boys after hearing about their business.

Animation Club

So, what awaits the dynamic pair in 2021?

The boys explain: "We have recently created an exciting addition called *Animation Club*.



"This is a yearly membership with lots of benefits. For only £97 the member will receive a brand-new animation sent directly to their email on the first of every month helping them to always have fresh social media content throughout the year.

"They also receive a bonus animation upon signing up meaning they receive 13 animations as well as a 50% discount against any other animations plus having the opportunity to join our members only Facebook networking group.

"Our plan is to have 1000 Animation club members onboard during 2021."

Busy boys

They have become the youngest ever Eastbourne Chamber of Commerce members and, via dad, belong to an Eastbourne based networking BNI group where they get to meet and speak with lots of other local business owners.

They are set to complete their second Diploma in the early part of 2021 which they have been studying via The Internet Business School.

They were given complimentary access by company owner and author Simon Coulson.

The boys go on: "We have sponsored a brand-new media platform called TALK BUSINESS WITH... which launches in early 2021.

"This will help give us visibility to a wider international audience of business owners and entrepreneurs.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 medium onion, white or red, chopped.
- 1 large carrot washed or peeled and chopped.
- 1 large celery stick washed and chopped.
- 3 cloves garlic finely chopped.
- 400g chopped tinned tomatoes.
- 1 tablespoon dried thyme and/or sage.
- 700ml vegetable stock.
- 400g tin of butter beans, drained and rinsed.
- Salt and pepper, to taste.
- 100g kale, washed and chopped.

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Heat a couple of tablespoons of water in the base of a large saucepan. Add the onion, carrot and celery with a pinch of salt. Sauté for 5 minutes on a medium-low heat with the lid on to soften the veg.

VEGETABLE AND BUTTER BEAN SOUP

Trep time: 5 mins Oook time: 25 mins Course: Main course

Servings: 4 medium portions

- 2. Add the garlic and tiny bit more water if needed and cook for another minute then pour in the tinned tomatoes, thyme and enough of the stock to cover the vegetables. Stir well, bring to the boil then reduce the heat and simmer with the lid on for 15 minutes.
- 3. Add the butter beans to the pan with a bit more stock if needed and cook for 5 minutes.
- 4. If you are serving this as a stew, add the kale to the pan and cook for another 5 minutes. Season to taste. Serve alongside whole-grain rice or grain of choice.
- 5. If you are serving as a soup, turn off the heat and remove 3-4 ladles of the mix into a bowl. Blitz the rest of the mix in the pan with a hand blender to break down and thicken the soup. Return the reserved mix to the pan and add more stock as needed to get a good soup consistency. Add the kale to the pan and simmer for 5 minutes.
- 6. Season with salt and pepper to taste and serve.



INGREDIENTS

- 210ml soya milk.
- 1 large orange, juice and grated zest, separated.
- 250g wholewheat or gluten free self-raising flour.
- 1 teaspoon baking powder.
- · A pinch of salt.
- 80g coconut sugar.
- 2 tablespoons maple syrup.
- 70ml olive oil.
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract.
- 150g cranberries, fresh or frozen.
- **50g pecan nuts** 10 whole, the remainder finely chopped.

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Line a 2lb loaf tin with non-stick baking paper. Pre-heat the oven to 180°C.
- 2. Pour the soya milk into a large jug and add the orange juice. This will curdle the milk slightly - this is good as it will help the cake rise once in the oven.

CRANBERRY, ORANGE AND PECAN LOAF

Trep time: 10 mins **Cook time: 20-25 mins

Course: Dessert

¶ Servings: 10 good slices

- 3. Place the flour, baking powder, salt and grated orange zest into a large bowl and mix well to combine.
- 4. Once the soya milk has curdled, add the coconut sugar, maple syrup, olive oil and vanilla extract. Mix well to combine.
- 5. Pour the wet mix into the dry flour mix and rapidly but gently stir to combine - as it comes together, add the cranberries and chopped pecan nuts to incorporate them into the mix. Don't worry if the mix is a little lumpy.
- 6. Quickly transfer the mix into the prepared loaf tin and gently place the whole pecans on top, slightly pressing them into the mix. Tap the tin of the worktop then place in the oven.
- **7.** Bake for 25 minutes. Check to see if the cake is done by piercing with a skewer or cocktail stick. If it's coated with some mix, place back in the oven for a few minutes and check again. Don't let the top get over-browned though.
- 8. Once the skewer is clean, remove the tin from the oven and leave to cool for 5 minutes before turning it out onto a cooling rack to cool completely.





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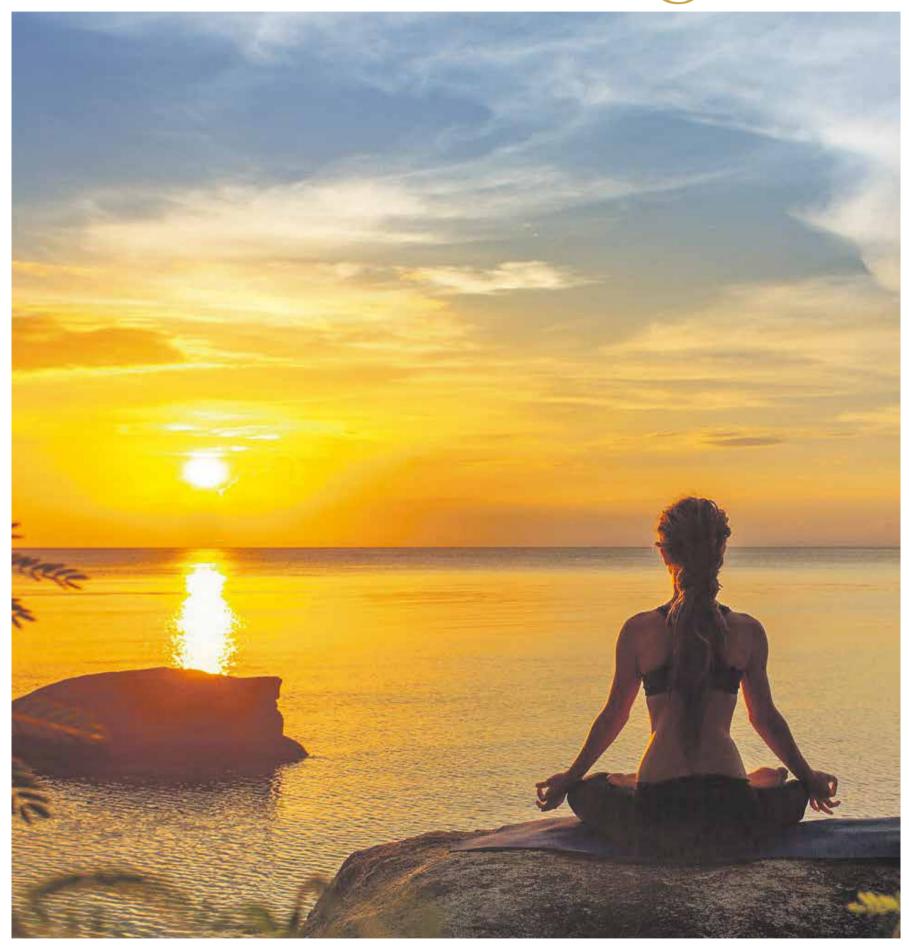

Turmeric: superfood or superfake?

TURMERIC is a plant that grows in Southeast Asia and is used as a spice, but it is also used as a supplement for its medicinal properties.

According to Consumer Lab, turmeric supplements were the seventh most popular when surveyed by supplement users. But are they worth the hype?

Turmeric benefits

High amounts of particular enzymes, like prostaglandins and leukotrienes, create inflammation in our body. While some inflammation can be beneficial to our health, an excess amount of inflammation can damage our health in a variety of ways.

Many diseases originate from chronic inflammation, such as arthritis, heart disease, diabetes and Alzheimer's disease. Elevated inflammation has even been connected to lowering our immune system and insulin resistance.

To help combat inflammation most people take anti-inflammatory

prescription drugs, called NSAIDs. Common NSAIDs, like aspirin or ibuprofen, work by inhibiting some of the enzymes that signal the body to create inflammation (called COX-1 and COX-2). However, there are some inflammatory enzymes that NSAIDs cannot block.

Wouldn't it be great if we had something available to us that could block a broader range of inflammatory enzymes? We do, and its been used for its medicinal properties since 500 B.C. According to *Life Extension*, turmeric is a unique herb that can inhibit a broader spectrum of inflammatory enzymes than NSAIDs, especially when it is combined with ginger root.

Since turmeric is a natural herb, your body does not recognise it as foreign (as it does with NSAIDs). Because of this it works along with your body's processes, instead of inducing an increase risk of toxicity.

Turmeric does more than behave as simply an anti-inflammatory. According to Sahdeo Prasad, author of Herbal Medicine: Biomolecular and Clinical Aspects, just in the last twenty-five years there have been "over 3000 publications of turmeric". Throughout his thorough search of these scientific publications he found many clinical studies showing turmeric to be "antibacterial, antiviral, antitumour, antioxidant, antiseptic, anti-inflammatory, caridoprotective, hepatoprotective, nephroprotective, radioprotective and digestive protective."

Turmeric and longevity

Perhaps, one of the reasons turmeric has so many benefits is due to how it boosts longevity. Turmeric contains an active chemical, called curcumin (the same pigment that gives it that orange colour), that can inhibit a chemical pathway in the body linked with ageing. According to the Oxidative Medicine and Cellular Longevity Journal, curcumin has been found in studies to increase healthy cell death and create new mitochondria, two major factors in ageing.

Different forms of turmeric

Many people are unaware of the difference between turmeric powder and turmeric extract, which is the form found in supplements. Turmeric powder from crushed turmeric contains about 3% curcumin. However, turmeric extract contains a concentration of curcumin as high as 95%. This means turmeric extract is almost 27 times more potent than regular turmeric powder.

A problem with turmeric extract is that it has poor bioavailability, meaning it is not easily absorbed into our blood stream after digestion. However, mixing turmeric with black pepper (or piperine extract) can increase its bioavailability. Since turmeric combines with fats, it is also best to take the supplement during a meal with fats, or a 'liposomal' version of turmeric for better absorption.

Heavy metals and fake turmeric

Due to the lack of regulation of dietary supplements, many supplements get away with not being what they claim to be. In 2019, Consumer Reports tested different samples of popular turmeric supplements. They found that over a third of them had "elevated levels of lead and bacteria, as well as low levels of key active compounds [curcumin]." Many turmeric supplements contain heavy metals, excess bacteria and are much lower in purity than is advertised.

What should we buy?

Organic sellers with a certification like 'GMP' or 'NSF' that have products with no additives tend to be more reputable. However, be sure to look for turmeric supplements from sellers that test their product with a third party, provide their physical address and have been established for years.

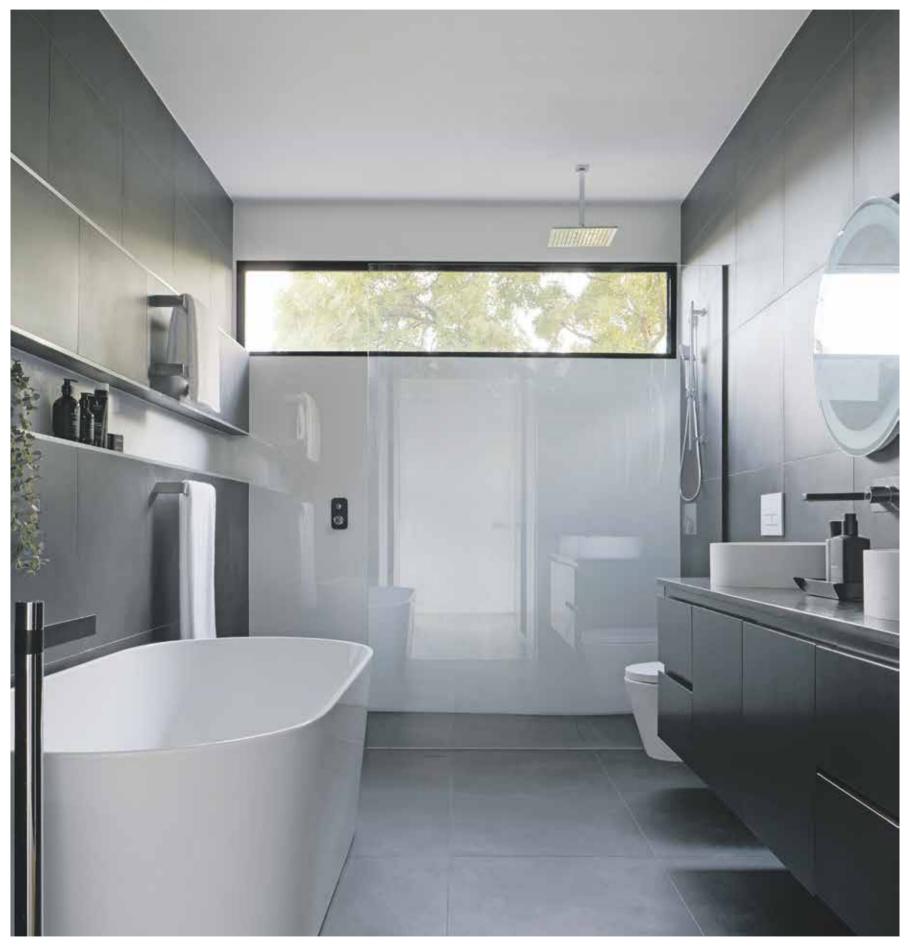

The South East market finished the year 5.5% higher than it started.

It will be a busy start to 2021

Despite the clock ticking towards the end of the stamp duty concession, around 130,000 sales were agreed over the last month, up by a remarkable 44% on the same period in 2019. A month ago we said that there were a massive 650,000 sales agreed and in the pipeline. One month on, and a month closer to that deadline, the figure remains at around 650,000 because 130,000 additional sales have started and replaced the 130,000 completions that have taken place in the last month.

It will be a slower second quarter once the stamp duty holiday is over, though even with the average price in Britain up by 6.6% this year, cheap mortgage rates available for some leave scope for further modest price growth despite the loss of the tax saving. All regions have seen greater average price increases than the average savings in stamp duty, indicating affordability headroom. Pandemic-related uncertainties have been around for nearly a year, and Brexit uncertainties for far longer but record activity has proved that movers are willing and able to act on their new priorities. Demand has exceeded

supply in 2020 with the number of properties coming to market for the year to date down by 0.6% on the same period in 2019, and the number of sales agreed up by 8.3% indicating scope for some further modest price increases in 2021.

Rightmove forecasts 4% national average house price growth in 2021.

The unexpected market momentum of 2020 overcame the unknowns of the pandemic and associated economic fallout, and though headwinds and uncertainties remain, demand for housing and buyer affordability appear to be strong enough to outweigh these dampening effects.

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IT'S all looking and sounding good for a local band with no management deal and a European support tour cancelled. The band are itching to get out and play to live audiences.

Just before Christmas I sat down with founder member, Danny Bloomfield and lead vocalist Andy Thomas, to chat about the band and asked them about this new venture and how they see things mapping out.

First and foremost, how did you all meet and how did you happen to come up with the strange format? You've chosen to perform songs by female singers, but you have changed the genres of the songs?

Andy — "It was Dan's idea. Initially, we thought he was bonkers suggesting it, but as the idea started to unravel, we all thought, actually, this might just work".

Dan — "Actually, it never really was my idea. I'd been invited down for a jam by an old friend of mine. We had a couple of rehearsals, rehashing songs we'd all played before. It was fun, but before I knew it most of the original members had either left or were thinking about it and enthusiasm was waning.

"One of the songs we were playing just happened to remind me of the Joan Osborn song What if God Was One of Us and, after a bit of convincing and restructure, a reggae beat and a few spice girl lyrics it became one of our classics. This gave me the idea of this fun concept.

"It's nice to hear new music, but also nice to hear songs you already know. Nobody at a gig wants to hear new material, in fact, the line 'This one's from our new album' will strike fear into the gig attendees heart! So now, at one of our concerts, one can have the comfort of a familiar song with the freshness of its new form.

"To add to that, we have our tongues pressed firmly into our cheeks with cheeky musical homages to other songs to accompany Andy's powerful, far-from-feminine voice."

Andy – "For me, from the outset I felt that my comfort zone was out the window. It's been a real test at times, but loving every minute of it.

"I feel lucky having the opportunity with these chaps and having the chance to chop-and-change the styles of vocals."



So will there be any male vocal covers in there?

Dan — "Never say never. Some of our versions have snippets of male songs. It's not easy to play a medley without Lou Reed, Elvis and Ozzy. And if the mood takes us and sounds good, then there's not much on the exclusion list."

Andy — "Absolutely, think a mix and match will always be there."

Because of the strange angle of the project, was it easy convincing other fellow musicians to join the collaboration?

Dan — "It was and it wasn't. We didn't get any 'maybes.' It's a Marmite concept—if you like it, you like it and if you don't then you don't. After going through my phone-book and my family members, it was relatively easy."

Andy — "I thought it would be a dream coming together for any musician who loves to experiment. At times, it proved a bit tricky, but we got there in the end."

What's your song converting process?

Dan – "I love all kinds of music and sometimes when I hear a song on the radio, in a shop or in a lift it can be interpreted differently. *Like a Virgin* is an excellent slow blues number. The riff to *Paranoid* does fit very well into *Kids in America* and, as it turns out, *Nothing Compares To You* is a killer ska number.

"I'm looking forward to seeing the faces in an audience as they try to work out what song they've heard before, but now they're hearing in a new way."

Andy — "We have all put our two penn'orth in, but Dan has an amazing ability to bring the most ridiculous collaborated ideas to the table, and when Joe (Walsh) the guitarist and drummer Terry (Golding) get their teeth into the idea as well, things tend to get very silly. Even more so when the brass, backing vocal and sax parts are replaced by Henry (Bloomfield) squidgy synth parts.

"Most of the time they work. Not all the time I hasten to add. The mix of Cleo Laine and Metallica was pushing it... although they all would beg to differ, hahaha!"

Who do you think you sound like?

Dan – "An egotistical musical genius."

Andy – "Ainsley Harriot after knocking up a soufflé to die for!"

What's next for you?

Dan — "I am currently writing an anthology of poetry and learning to pilot a helicopter."

Andy – "Find some really smashing blouses to wear and trying to prove Darwin was wrong."

Good luck with it all guys. Looking forward to seeing and hearing you later in the year.

Richard has spent most of his life working in the pump industry in Eastbourne.

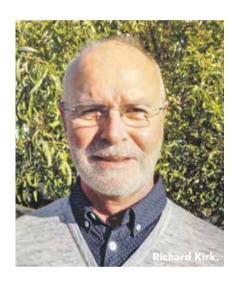
He gave up work in 2015 after travelling the world with his job as European Sales Manager with the extra responsibility for training others about pumping technology from around the globe.

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Classic tracks



Over 50 years ago in 1969, Led Zeppelin burst onto the music scene with the release of their first studio album titled, simply, Led Zeppelin.

From the moment you hear the opening bars of the first track, it's clear the band were making a statement of intent.

That first track is the stomping Good Times Bad Times.

Drummer, John Bonham, just 20 years old at the time, perfectly demonstrates what would become his trademark playing: power, groove and an incredibly fast kick drum technique. Today he is justifiably recognised as one of the greatest rock drummers of all time.

Good Times Bad Times — LED ZEPPELIN

Released: March 1969

Guitarist and Producer, Jimmy Page, at the time an already highly regarded musician and top London session player, provides guitar that has been described as 'fat with menace'.

Add to this, the rhythmic bass of John Paul Jones and the powerful vocals of singer Robert Plant, the message from the band is certainly one of: 'We are here and we mean business'.

Good Times Bad Times was the first of many classic songs the band released over two decades, and even after all these years the four musicians that were Led Zeppelin are still some of the most influential and esteemed today.

And, incredibly, the whole album took just 36 hours to record and mix at a cost of $\mathfrak{L}1,782$. As the band didn't have a record contract at the time, it was funded by Jimmy and their manager, former Hellingly resident, Peter Grant.

WE look at songs that have shaped the career of the artists and the music industry.



Like a Prayer is the title track from Madonna's fourth studio album of the same name.

It features prominent and highly regarded bass playing by English session musician and Brighton resident, Guy Pratt.

Guy, who has worked with Pink Floyd, Michael Jackson, Tears for Fears, Robert Palmer and Tom Jones to name just a few, was hired to play bass on the album but says he has little recollection of playing on this particular track. So much so that months later, when he was invited to a studio to hear the final mixed version of the song, he asked Madonna who was playing the bass. Madonna replied, "It's you, dummy!"

Like a Prayer – MADONNA

Released: March 1989

Another prominent feature of the song is the use of a choir. The Andraé Crouch Choir was hired to add background vocals. Crouch reportedly studied the lyrics of the song to make sure it didn't contain anything that was against their religious beliefs.

Recorded at a time when large budgets were available and real musicians were favoured over machines, many other top, and award-winning, session players were hired to play on the recording. There's even some uncredited guitar parts by Prince.

The track, that Madonna was cowriter and producer of, received widespread critical acclaim and, along with the title album, was considered a turning point in Madonna's career with critics acknowledging her as a true artist, and not just a pop star.

Have a listen and check out that superb bass playing!



Baker Street - GERRY RAFFERTY

Named after Baker Street in London, the song is from Gerry Rafferty's second solo album, City to City.

The song has one, if not the, most famous saxophone solos ever recorded. The player, Raphael Ravenscroft said *Baker Street* irritated him because his solo was flat.

The bluesy, eight-bar sax riff helped make *Baker Street* a soft-rock hit. It reached No.3 in Britain and No.2 in the U.S in 1978 and still receives considerable airplay today.

Ravenscroft received a flat fee — often reported to be just £27 for his work on the song, which made Gerry Rafferty a fortune.

Released: February 1978

But the hit kick-started Ravenscroft's career who went on to work with Pink Floyd, ABBA and Marvin Gaye.

His daughter said her father was actually "very proud of *Baker Street* and that it made people feel good."

Guitarist Slash cited it as an influence on his solo in *Sweet Child o' Mine*.



Can't Get You Out of My Head - KYLIE MINOGUE

Can't Get You Out of My Head is a song that was recorded by Australian singer Kylie Minogue for her eighth studio album Fever.

The song was jointly written, composed & produced by Cathy Dennis and Rob Davis who were brought together by British artist manager Simon Fuller.

For those who can remember a band called Mud from the mid 70's, Rob Davies was the guitarist who always wore cat suites and massive dangling earrings that would have looked good on Pat Butcher.

S Club 7 rejected the song and English singer-songwriter Sophie Ellis-Bextor also turned down the offer to record it.

Released: September 2001

Davis began playing an acoustic guitar over a 125bpm drum loop, on which Dennis began singing the line, "I just can't get you out of my head."

The whole song (including Kylie's vocals) was recorded at Davis' home studio in Surrey. The song became a massive hit all over the world collecting award after award.



Green and pleasant

January is the beginning of the gardening year — a time for fresh starts, renewed energy, and grand plans for the twelve months ahead. That said, it can be really difficult out there, due to the cold and the ground being so hard.

Planning ahead

Why not decide to list all the plants you buy so that you don't forget what you've got! If, like me, you open your garden, it is inevitable that visitors ask what certain plants are and it can be embarrassing if you don't know. In recent years, I have logged them all down so that I can recall their names if asked. It's a good idea, even if you don't open your plot as friends and family may ask! If you rely on plant labels, they can fade or go missing, so why not get yourself a notebook that you can record your purchases

throughout the year! It might be an idea to leave a bit of space under each entry so you can write details about the plant as the year goes on. Make sure you record where it is planted too and you'll be surprised how much of a valuable resource this can become over time!

Caring for your pond

If you have a pond with fish, then it is important to stop it freezing over at this time of year and keep your fish free from harm. An ideal way to do this is to float a ball in the water, this will help prevent it from totally freezing over and allow oxygen into the water. It is not advisable to smash the ice on the pond, as the shockwaves can damage the fish. If your pond is frozen over, then one way to break the ice is to place a warm pan on the surface, which will gently melt the ice.

Driftwood garden plans

Looking forward, I hope I will be able to open my garden again in 2021. I have committed to three dates for the National Garden Scheme in June, July and August but they will not be full public days. I have decided up to 14 visitors can enter on every hour, and entry will be by pre-paid ticket only. All being well we will open for the Macmillan Coastal Garden Trail again at the end of July. Check my garden website for all the details on how to book a visit. The garden will open for private visits too.

Fun project

A fun idea for your garden this year might be to take a photograph from the same point, on the same date in each of the 12 months of the year! Maybe using several points of interest. This is something I've done over the years and it is quite surprising to look back at the collection and actually see the changes, across both the months and the seasons of the year! I'm planning to do the same throughout 2021 with both my beach garden at the front of the house and the main garden at the back.

Planting inspiration

A perfect indoor task this month is to look through Spring catalogues and choose some annuals to have delivered. I usually buy most from a local nursery in Eastbourne but also get some online as well. I never set out with a plan of what colours I want to use throughout the garden. As far as the nursery is concerned, I go and look at what they have and then buy what I like. Once back in the garden, I decide what looks best where. There is never any grand plan. For the last few years, I have trialled several new plants from a well-known company and reported

back on how they have fared in my coastal plot. I expect to be doing the same again this Summer too.

The first 2021 National Garden Scheme gardens begin to open their garden gates next month for the annual snowdrop openings. I moved many shrubs planted in the ground last Autumn, but the large, containerised ones, will all start to be relocated over the coming weeks. It is quite amazing how easy it can be to make your plot look a little different each year! I challenge you to give it a go.
