

The JPK Project — run by the amazing Jill Parker — has its base at 39-41 Church Street, Old Town. It is dedicated to helping people with learning disabilities and their families.

The JPK Project continues to provide supported living for adults with learning disabilities in Gow Lodge.

Jill and the Trustees have now let the former Old Town Café building to SASBAH — The Sussex Association for Spina Bifida and Hydrocephalus.

SASBAH was based at Gun Hill, Chiddingly, but it is delighted to have now moved into *The JPK* Project building.

It has more than 60 years experience supporting and developing the health, wellbeing and life opportunities of people with physical and learning disabilities.

It provides a range of fun and exciting activities in local communities across Sussex and also runs an invaluable advice and advocacy service.

Saspire is also owned by SASBAH and now operates from the Church Street premises. This provides work-related



opportunities for *SASBAH* members, and its biggest contract is with *Brewers*, also based in Eastbourne.

Chief Executive Officer Rom Sanglaji said: "SASBAH is very proud to be celebrating its 60th anniversary in 2025, and what a wonderful way to start the year.

The company has also announced sponsorship of *Eastbourne Carnival*. Rob said: "Supporting our local





On Wednesday, 19th March, a special event at Towner Eastbourne will explore how climate change is affecting water in East Sussex, both in our environment and in our homes. From flooding and drought to coastal change and water shortages, the discussion will focus on what we're experiencing now and what the next 100 years could bring.

Hosted by Blue Heart, this thoughtprovoking panel will bring together experts in meteorology, flood resilience, and climate science.

Among the confirmed panellists are: **Anna Hastings** – Blue Heart Project Manager, leading innovative local flood resilience initiatives


Visitors can experience the fun and nostalgia of the miniature trains, the famous 1/8th scale locomotives will take you on a journey around the beautiful country park.

Make a splash for Hospice fundraiser

SWIMMERS are being asked to make a splash for St Wilfrid's Hospice in Eastbourne by taking part in its Swim the Distance fundraising challenge.

Throughout March, people are encouraged to swim between 5km and 56km to raise money for the hospice.

James Sneath, pictured, was the first person to sign up.

He said: "As part of my new year's resolution, I decided to take up swimming again for fitness reasons.

"Then, when I found out about the St Wilfrid's Swim the Distance challenge, I was keen to sign up. The hospice does so much for so many people in Eastbourne and beyond, that I thought it would be a great incentive to swim and raise money.

"My training has started slowly but I'm building up all the time. I'm currently swimming three times a week and plan to increase in the run-up to the challenge. My aim is to swim at least 5km across the month, but may do more if it goes well."

There are four set distances to choose from: 5km, the length of the River Cuckmere; 15km, the length of Lake Windemere; 34km, the distance of the English Channel; or 56km, the length of the Antarctic Sound. Alternatively, participants can set their own distance.

Signing up for the event is free, and participants will be asked to pledge to raise a minimum of £121 to fund a nurse for a day. Fundraisers who reach set milestones will receive *St Wilfrid's* branded items. Raising £30 earns a swimming cap, £60 a t-shirt, and anyone reaching £500 will be given a hoodie.





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Member Spotlight: Little Gate Farm



Little Gate is a charity that transforms the lives of people with learning disabilities and autism. They support adults, helping them develop the skills and confidence needed to secure meaningful paid work.

The Charity was founded in 2013 by Claire and David Cordell. As parents of a daughter with a learning disability, they witnessed the stark contrast in opportunities available to her compared to her twin brother. Recognising the urgent need for better employment pathways, they established Little Gate to help bridge this gap.

Since then, Little Gate has grown its services to include supported work training, supported apprenticeships, and supported employment. These programmes provide tailored support to individuals, enabling them to gain workplace experience and transition into paid employment.

In September 2024, Little Gate launched Little Gate College. This new educational programme is for people aged 16-24 who have an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP). The scheme offers two specialised study programmes: Future Ready and Supported Internships.

Little Gate has helped people with learning difficulties and autism find work with several chamber members. Opposite are just a few examples.

Charlie's Journey to Employment with Little Gate Supported Apprenticeships



At just 20 years old, Charlie has already demonstrated remarkable dedication to securing a stable future for himself and his family. In April 2024, he joined the Little Gate Supported Apprenticeship Programme,

eager to find long-term employment. Over the summer, he successfully moved into his own council accommodation - an important milestone in his independence.

Charlie possessed strong skills in mathematics and engineering, and also has previous experience of manual labour. While open to different career paths, he sought a hands-on, varied role within a supportive environment.

Little Gate matched Charlie with a three-week work placement at Wealden District Council, assisting the Caretaking department.

With the support of a Job Coach, he quickly adapted to his responsibilities. His Job Coach noted his growing confidence, initiative, and ability to work both independently and as part of a team. By the final week, Charlie's colleagues were already recognising his contributions.

Thanks to the skills and confidence gained through the LEAPS course and his work experience, Charlie was offered a Level 2 Customer Service Apprenticeship as a Part-time Assistant Caretaker at Wealden District Council. Now four months into his role, he is thriving, supported by a Job Coach for 75% of his working hours. His employer anticipates he will gain full independence within a year.

Wealden District Council's Learning and Development Officer praised the programme, stating, "Partnering with Little Gate has been a rewarding experience, benefiting both Charlie and our organisation. His story is a testament to how the right support can transform lives and create lasting employment opportunities."

Eastbourne in partnership with Little Gate College

Little Gate College's employment programmes collaborate with Eastbourne businesses to provide placements across a diverse range of industries, including hospitality, retail, administration, manufacturing and construction.

James recently joined Morrisons Eastbourne on a twelve-week internship, starting out in the Amazon department. By his second shift James was picking and bagging items independently. He is now developing his skills within the Café.

Store Manager Rob Knight explains: "James has settled in well as part of the team and is already showcasing great abilities and teamwork. We look forward to seeing how he progresses within the business"



In January, Four Future Ready students began placements at The View Hotel, in their restaurant and conference & banqueting departments.

The hotel shared their experience of partnering with Little Gate: "Little Gate Supported Employment was completely new to us, but it has been nothing short of amazing. The students are thriving at the hotel, and we're truly enjoying having them as part of our team. We're excited to see the long-term benefits it brings to our workplace and community."



Friends of Ocklynge Cemetery

BY the 1850s the graveyard around *St Mary's Church* in Old Town was virtually full.

So in 1854 the Eastbourne
Burial Board purchased a field
called Ocklynge Piece in order
for a cemetery to be established.
For the next century it became
the main resting place for tens
of thousands of Eastbourne
citizens and visitors.

Rifles and anchors

Many graves were unmarked but others were adorned with magnificent monuments; angels ceaselessly point upwards towards heaven, stone rifles rest against old soldiers graves and large anchors are seen either symbolising a maritime grave or that the deceased was 'anchored' to their faith.

The Friends of Ocklynge Cemetery were established three years ago with the aim of helping to care for the cemetery and to research the history of the people buried there.

Kevin Gordon, the Chairman of the group said "Ocklynge Cemetery is an encyclopaedia of Eastbourne history; Prime Ministers wives, Mayors and Members of Parliament are buried near poorer fishermen, bath-chairmen and young children. There are national heroes and champion sporting stars."

Finding graves

The Friends regularly assist people in finding the graves of their loved ones. They work with *Family Roots*, the local Family History Society and the Crematoria staff to assist members of the public.

A haven for flora and fauna and the *Friends* have liaised with wildlife groups to get advice. Committee member Jo Barber has arranged bird and bat watches.

Eastbourne Council have previously provided a small grant to the Cemetery Friends, sadly this funding is no longer available.








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

Exercise: the miracle cure

WHEN Professor Scarlett McNally was diagnosed with cancer in 2018, she was told she was too sick to have a stem cell transplant.

The *DGH* consultant orthopaedic surgeon knew she had to get fit so she could have the transplant, and that is when she turned to using an electric bike.

Having potentially only months to live, the treatment in 2020 was successful and Professor McNally now leads a full and healthy life.

She has been named in Cycling UK's #100WomenInCycling 2024, and was nominated because of her work championing active travel and policies to reduce ill health, road traffic injuries and pollution.

My bike saved my life

She said: "I credit my electric bike for saving my life, it's as simple as that. I was very unwell and I had to get fit. Even when I was tired throughout the chemo, the electric bike gives assistance to keep the legs going. I cycled every day come rain or shine, and I hope that is a powerful message to everyone. "There is no doubt that exercise leads to one becoming much healthier, and it reduces complications of health conditions you may have.

"It can be difficult to get started but for me it became part of my everyday life. The best forms of exercise are what fits into a person's schedule. People are becoming less fit and this impacts on the rest of society. There are record numbers of people unable to work because of long-term sickness and ten million informal carers in this country which means less tax revenue that can harm the economy."

Professor McNally writes articles in the British Medical Journal and has been on a number of health committees. She now works parttime at the Trust and travels to work and conferences by electric bike and train. She has written about exercise reducing complications following surgery by half.



Bespoke Cycle Group

She was also instrumental in setting up the Bespoke Cycle Group in Eastbourne back in 2008.

She said: "Eastbourne is only four miles across — an easy distance on a cycle. Bespoke is about changing hearts and minds and also the need to improve our infrastructure. The message was: 'get on your bike and do it.'

"I led on a medical academy report called 'Exercise: the miracle cure' showing that 150 minutes of exercise each week reduces the risk of serious illness dramatically - for example, the risk of being diagnosed with dementia drops by 30 per cent, Type 2 diabetes 40 per cent and older people's falls by half."

Exceptional women

Cycling UK's #100WomenInCycling 2024 highlights the 100 exceptional women who promote cycling and encourage others to take part.

It celebrates inspirational women who are leading by example in this wonderful and life-enhancing activity.

Women from all walks of life and every corner of the cycling world have been nominated, from mountain bikers and endurance cyclists to community group leaders, cycling school-run mums and industry entrepreneurs.

The initiative was set up because at every age group, women cycle around three times less than men.





Sweet Circus CIC is a a nonprofit organisation providing opportunities for people of all ages, backgrounds and abilities to benefit from engagement in circus play and learning circus skills.

It does this through, classes, workshops and online retail.

The group has moved into new premises at 18 Bourne Street and its priorities are physical, mental and social wellbeing through circus.

Its activities are open to all — it's inclusive, fully accessible and there no barriers to taking part.

Miz Wells is the brainchild behind *Sweet Circus*.

She said: "We have been operating now for around 10 years and each week we have around 70 people come through our doors.

"That includes children from the age of four, youths, adults and 50-plus. We also have specific SEND provision and take our activities to care homes, Schools and community groups. "We also take part in various events and festivals. We are thrilled with our new venue but also operate sessions from *St Elizabeth's Church* in Old Town, and our 50-plus sessions run out of the main *Tesco* in Lottbridge Drove."

So what can you expect from a session at Sweet Circus?

Miz said: "Well, you would be welcomed in and reassured that your feelings of anxiety and excitement are perfectly normal, we'll introduce you to a few new friends and start our warmup.

Let's say you've come to a beginner Sling class, we'll then introduce you to the equipment with some strengthening exercises, you don't have to be strong to start, but you need to start to get strong! In your



very first session you will find the confidence and ability to get off the ground, sitting or standing in what could be described as a silky hammock.

You will learn a couple of moves or poses and will have a room full of supporters encouraging and supporting you. Before you leave, we'll have a bit of a stretch and chat. We will work at your pace throughout the session and help you listen to your own body. You don't have to bring a friend; the social aspect is very important to what we do. Many positive friendships have been made through circus!

"It's all about having fun, exercising with the emphasis on agility, balance, co-ordination, confidence and resilience!



So, why are circus activities good for you?

Miz said: "For people who feel marginalised, underconfident, or lonely we provide a safe space and enhance each one's positive self-image.

"Circus is physically active, but can be accessed at any level, so you will be developing your lung, and heart health and building strength and bone density all in a socially supportive, non-judgemental environment. It dose not matter how strong, fit, flexible, slim, coordinated or old you are.

"I am a great believer that failure is the first attempt in learning, and learning together creates social support networks. We use the sensory aspects of circus to develop emotion regulation and the social aspects to develop how we support each other.

"Circus Skills have many benefits, juggling, for example, can have a calming effect, destressing and resetting the brain. It has been shown to improve memory, concentration, strengthen and develop synapses in the brain and grow more brain cells, all of which can postpone the onset of brain disease as well as improving our functionality in daily life.

Risk management is also important, we see many young people who are risk adverse, as well as those who are thrill seekers — we teach that there are 'safe' ways safe to push limits. Bruises make you better, broken bones do not."

Polegate Ramblers' photo archive

LAST year was the 65th anniversary of the *Polegate Rambling Club*, which started life as *'The Polegate Field Paths Preservation Society'* in 1969, with the purpose of 'restoring, sign-posting and maintaining direction signs, stiles, gates, etc'.

In pre-social media days the club was diligent in keeping scrapbooks of walks, trips, meetings, events and working parties, all recorded in nine big photo albums. A project has recently taken place to scan all the scrapbook pages and make them available on the club website. The exercise was an eye-opener to the ways in which the club has changed, and how it's remained the same.

Back in the day, *The Heavy Gang* went out to clear footpaths and rebuild stiles with materials provided by the council. Not a hint of health & safety, the volunteers were able to undertake the jobs using their own skills and common sense.

Once established, as well as walking locally, members went on many coach trips for walking and sight-seeing, including several visits to Dieppe. They ran stalls at fetes, raised money for charity, attended slide-shows and illustrated talks. From time to time the club welcomed blind ramblers who they accompanied on suitable walks.

The walks were organised in a much more informal fashion than today;

the rambles secretary enlisting future walk leaders at a coffee stop during a ramble, and noting them in his little black book! Initially walks were just a few miles usually in the afternoon, but at some point the three walk options were adopted, all starting in the morning. There seemed to be a lot more publunching than there is now, although still plenty of picnicking.

Many scenes are virtually unchanged – the downs, pubs & villages; although some of the photographic evidence shows the march of time – there were several more yards of cliff at Birling Gap than there are now, and one photo shows ramblers crossing a muddy scar across the landscape – soon to become the A27 Polegate bypass.

The people in the older photos would be over 100 now. I wonder if the *Polegate Ramblers* of 2089 will look back fondly at our memories on the Facebook page, and marvel at the similarities and differences of now and then.



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Green and pleasant

MARCH is officially the beginning of spring but it can still be very cold at times, so keep an eye on the weather forecast and wait to do jobs if conditions aren't quite right. The clocks also go forward on the 30th, so the lengthening daylight hours will help plants to really get growing and give you more time outdoors. Spring bulbs start to take centre stage in the borders and in patio pots, rewarding your efforts for planting them last autumn.

If you are in to growing vegetables, now is the time to get seeds started in the greenhouse, and you can sow hardy seeds straight outdoors into their final positions. It's also time to kickstart your flower displays. Start sowing flower seeds undercover to enjoy colourful displays come summer.

National Garden Scheme

This month, here are three wonderful gardens you can visit through the scheme. The first, *Bates Green Garden* in Tye Hill Road, Arlington, opens on Sunday 9th March from 10:30am until 3:30pm with entry £7 and children £3.50. This plants woman's tranquil garden provides interest through the

seasons with a woodland garden created around a majestic oak tree. The courtyard gardens have seasonal container displays and the front garden is a spring joy with narcissi, primroses and violets. Walk through a wild daffodil glade leading to the 24-acre ancient oak wood, home of the Arlington Bluebell Walk too. Pictured in the header, cyclamen at Bates Green, taken by John Glover.

Next, a gorgeous National Trust garden, Nymans in Staplefield Road, Handcross, which will open on Saturday 15th March from 10am to 5pm with entry £19 and children £9.50. This is one of the National Trust's premier gardens with rare and unusual plant collections of national significance. At this time of year appreciate blossom, bulbs and a stunning collection of subtly fragranced magnolias.

The third plot is Limekin Farm in Chalvington Road, Chalvington, near Hailsham, which will open at the end of the month across the weekend of the 29th and 30th March, from 2pm to 5pm with entry £8. The garden was designed in the 1930s and it has not changed in basic layout since then. The planting aims to reflect the age of the 17th century and original garden design. Flint walls enclose the main lawn, herbaceous borders and rose garden and there is a nepeta lined courtyard, informal pond and specimen trees including a very ancient oak. See many spring flowers and tree blossom too.

Bulbs take centre stage!

This is the month when any spring bulbs we planted last autumn really take centre stage in our gardens. I suppose the main ones we all like to plant and grow are tulips, daffodils, crocus and hyacinths. I have quite a few of each at Driftwood in containers and many planted directly in the ground too. The great advantage of having them planted in a container means you can move the pot and place that fabulous splash of colour anywhere in the garden to maximum effect! Then, as the flowers die back, move the pot back to a less eye-catching spot.

Alternatively, if you adopt the lasagne method of bulb planting, which involves planting layers of bulbs in pots, just like making lasagne, the result is a pot crammed with wave after wave of spring flowers, giving you colour right through spring. To achieve this, place the latest-flowering bulbs at the bottom of the pot, with layers of earlier-flowering bulbs above them.

Mother's Day 2025

This year the day the clocks go back and Mother's Day both fall on the same day, Sunday 30th March. In the UK and across the world the favoured gift for Mothers always seems to be a bouquet of flowers or a pot plant. We're told that the pink carnation specifically represents a mother's love, but white, which symbolizes pure or unconditional love and good luck, is another good choice. As a bonus, carnations are one of the longer lasting cut flowers that you can buy, which means your gift will last. It's all down to personal choice, my mother is not a lover of carnations and I tend to buy her favourite which are freesias. It seems the top five chosen for Mum each year are tulips, roses, peonies, carnations and orchids. Take your pick and buy what you think your Mum will enjoy.

Four gardening jobs for March

Plant tender summer-flowering bulbs, including gladioli for a great show in the summer. Now is a good time for pruning roses too. Support your garden plants or climbers now, so they can grow up through them, making them less obvious. If you are planning on moving deciduous trees or shrubs, now is the time to do this task, provided the soil isn't frozen or waterlogged.
